2012 - Malala was critically injured.

2014 - Malala won the Nobel Peace Prize





#### **About the Nobel Prize**





To win a Nobel Prize a person has to be the greatest benefit to humankind in the areas of Physics, Chemistry, Physiology or Medicine, Literature, Economics and Peace.

→ At the age of 17, Malala became the youngest person to receive the award.
